- I. Consent Agenda (John Schmidt)
  - a. Chad Turner motioned to approve the consent agenda. Kevin Bradley seconded the motion. *The motion carried*.
    - i. October 27, 2021 Minutes
    - ii. December 8, 2021 Executive Committee Minutes
    - iii. FY22 Q2 Dashboard
- II. Chair's Report (John Schmidt)
  - a. Welcome to our newest board member, Dr. Sangeeta Driver. Sangeeta is our representative from Shirley Ryan AbilityLab.
  - b. Elect Officers for 2022
    - i. John Schmidt Chair
    - ii. Kevin Bradley Vice Chair
    - iii. Kent Klaus Treasurer
    - iv. Felicia Rauls Secretary
      - Chad Turner motioned to approve the slate of officers as submitted. Larry Goodman seconded the motion. The motion carried.
- III. President's Report (Karen Tamley)
  - a. Welcome to the officers and Sangeeta.

- b. We had a very successful 2021. We had an incredible legislative year. CESSA was one of the main bills that received a lot of attention it was a 6-year initiative. We also worked really hard this year on continuing our Covid response. We helped scheduled people for vaccine appointments. We distributed thousands of dollars in relief funds to our consumers. We launched our Covid resource page on the website. We worked with the state on guidance that would prevent discrimination of disabled people when hospital beds are at capacity. We also launched a digital relief program.
- c. We secured several large grants. We also had a successful Legacy Campaign and Legacy Event, where we unveiled the portrait of Marca. We had a clean audit with no findings. We continued to provide direct services to people all across the city.
- d. A few weeks ago we filed a lawsuit on behalf of Haymarket Center. That has received a lot of press coverage.
- e. We are building out our strategic plan. We are working toward the completion and execution of the Race Equity Plan. We are reimagining our office space.
- f. We will hold our first in-person gala for the first time in several years.
- g. Access Living is also up for Best Advocacy Organization by the Chicago Reader. Please visit the Reader website and vote for us.
- h. We had planned to launch our hybrid building reopening on January 10. However, due to the spread of the Omicron variant, we have postponed the reopening. We also instituted a vaccine and booster mandate.
- i. I was appointed to a Mayoral taskforce for a pilot program on universal basic income.
- j. I have been invited to speak on a panel about an inclusive workspace.
- k. Yesterday I was vetted to provide testimony on innovations in the workplace for people with disabilities.
- I. Karin Norington-Reaves has taken a leave from her role as head of Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership to run for the 1<sup>st</sup> Congressional Seat.
- m. Brenna has found a new job opportunity and her last day will be February 3.
- n. Race Equity Work (Daisy Feidt) around 4:30pm
  - i. Equity Team: Made up of staff, board (John, ShaRhonda, and Shari), and community members.

- ii. We have brainstormed actions and outcomes around 9 areas of the plan. We will really try to craft what the strategic plan is going to look like coming out of these brainstorming sessions.
  - 1. John: the brainstorming sessions have gotten into some very interesting concrete steps. As things move forward, there are some very interesting ideas being talked about.
- iii. ShaRhonda did a session of her Racial Crossfit training for Race Equity Team, and will do a more extensive version for the senior team.
- iv. Commitments Document
  - 1. Not asking for approval, but want to show you what we want to come out of this process.
  - It talks about things we want to happen with Access Living's culture but also, looking at and changing potential programs to be explicitly anti-racist and offer services that directly address past inequities.
  - 3. I think the team felt like this kind of a document was important, just so we can check throughout the process are we actually living up to these commitments.
- o. Karen: Justice Journey Expedition. Due to Omicron, it has been moved to April.
- p. Karen: I have been invited to join a cohort of white leaders doing anti-racism work called the Soul Squad.

#### IV. Program Committee (ShaRhonda)

- a. State Legislative Session (Amber)
  - i. Michelle Garcia, our Manager of Organizing and Community Development, is with us.
  - ii. We're taking on the sub-minimum wage bill, 14C.
  - iii. There is a shorter legislative session than usual.
  - iv. We would like to ask for money for home modifications. If Senator Harmon does not want to pass bills that require funding, this will be at risk.
    - 1. Ben: We need to accentuate the cost savings for people staying in the community vs going to institutions.
    - 2. John: The notion that every bill that has a cost...it seems like an obvious thing to allow people to make changes to their home.

- v. We are continuing to fight for the Legislative Accessibility Act.
  - Denise: I'm wondering if that also includes the accessibility of the General Assembly website. It's not the greatest website for those who need to navigate using screen reading and low-vision technology.
  - 2. Amber: 1. It requires a staff person to field reasonable accommodation requests. 2. It would put a reasonable accommodation request form on the website. 3. It would set up a task force for people to work on greater accessibility for engaging with legislators in general.
  - 3. John: Are the state chambers not physically accessible?
  - 4. Amber: It depends. Some of it has to do with what rooms you are talking about. The doors are hard to open. There is only one ramp entrance into the state capital, and there should be two. The more people you pack in, the less accessible it becomes. It creates overwhelming sound issues.
- vi. Voting: We are following Denise's lead in advocating for fully electronic voting options.
  - 1. Denise: Thank you for your help on this.
- vii. Picking your kid up for bad behavior is considered an informal suspension. AL is suggestion that Illinois start documenting these.
- viii. There is now a bill to expand Medicaid to cover immigrants with disabilities.
- ix. We continue to work with two lobbyists: Dave Lowitzki and Phil Milsk.
- x. Sangeeta: How do we prioritize legislative initiatives?
  - Amber: It depends on what we are seeing the community ask for.
     What is the leadership like? What type of bill is it? I would say
     that there is also a question of capacity. AL is part of a state
     coalition Disrupt LTC (Long Term Care).
  - 2. Amber: Last year we held a few town halls about health issues in the community and listed to what consumers were concerned about.
- b. Case Update (Ken Walden)
  - i. Haymarket Case: Early on we saw that it was likely that the Village of Itasca would reject Haymarket's application. That came to pass, so we

filed the lawsuit in the beginning of January. It's discriminatory against people with substance use disorder. We expect the Village to motion to dismiss the case. Their principle argument was that the presence would strain their emergency response system, so it was not a good location for the facility. In response to that, Haymarket contracted with Elite Ambulance to reduce stress on Itasca's system. They also said they would contract with an additional company if that became necessary. Also, Haymarket has medical staff. The second argument was that Haymarket patients would tax the school system. The Department of Justice opened an investigation. If they issue a separate lawsuit, or join our lawsuit, that will put a lot of pressure on the village.

- Every single news outlet in the city covered it thanks to our Communications Department and Haymarket's PR representatives.
- 2. Zak: Was AL involved with Rosecrance a few years ago?
- 3. Ken: Yes, we were involved.
- c. ShaRhonda: Accessibility of shelters. The city has warming centers available from
   9-5, but nothing about the nighttime. Are there any accessible centers open
   overnight? Do we have stories about people looking for shelters?
  - i. Karen: Before the holidays we developed a list of winter resources, including warming centers. Bridget, are there any overnight locations on our list?
  - ii. Bridget: I know we provided a variety of warming center options. Also, in the past we received press about the inaccessibility of shelters, but that was before Covid.
- d. Personal Assistant Program (Trish Seye)
  - i. As part of our marketing for the PA program, we have done two interviews with the AC Green Show. We will do another interview on Tuesday. It's a good opportunity for marketing, and for AL as a whole. It's a really good opportunity.
- V. Resource Development & Communications Committee (Jennifer Brown)
  - a. Lead Onward Bridge Support (Barbara Khalouf)

i. We have now officially surpassed the \$200,000 match for the bridge campaign. 2021 was our "ungala". Barring any additional Covid disruptions, we are planning to gather in person this year.

#### b. Gala (Jennifer Brown)

i. Mark your calendar for June 22, 2022 for an in-person Gala. The new venue is Offshore Chicago, which is at Navy Pier. It is a new venue for AL. It has a very different type of space to the ballroom, and I think it will offer a fresh take on the Gala. We are optimistic about our Corporate Chair. We also are very close to finalizing our awardee for the Gala.

#### c. Giving Tuesday

 November 30, 2021. Development and Communications worked together to develop a solicitation email and social media campaign. We raised significantly more than the previous year.

#### d. Grants (Barbara Khalouf)

i. First, we had a program officer from the Joyce Foundation reach out when he heard about CESSA's passage. In December we received word that our proposal was approved. We had a representative from the Prince Charitable Trust reach out to us as well. She contacted the bill's cosponsors, who told her to get in touch with AL. Again, we were awarded a grant to support the CESSA work. Getting funding for our advocacy work is typically quite hard.

#### e. Development General (Jennifer Brown)

i. We have a long-time family foundation partner that has been supporting us with \$75,000/year. They just honored us with a commitment for \$75,000/year for five years. We have an incredible anonymous donor, that has been supporting at \$350,000/year. They have increased support for \$500,000/year for the next two years.

#### f. Communications (Bridget Hayman)

i. We have been working very hard to elevate visibility. In the packet we included the Haymarket media clips. Over the holidays the CDC announced over 1 million deaths due to opioids over the past year, and that resonated with a lot of media outlets. We were able to showcase the disability angle of the story.

#### VI. Finance & Human Resources Committee (Neil Anderson)

- a. Neil reviewed the actuals through November 30, 2021.
  - i. Variance Analysis: Revenue: Government Grants: \$20,000 less than anticipated due to a timing issue. Corporate/foundations: over \$1 million over budget thanks to our anonymous donor. In addition to that, there is a 5-year pledge from crown for \$75,000/year. We did not budget additional revenues from the Legacy Campaign, but we had \$229,000 come in from pledges. Expenses: Salaries were better than budget due to open positions. Travel and food was down \$38,000 due to Covid. Specific program expenses came in better than budget...we are still ramping up the gun violence program.
  - ii. Income Statement: 48% increase over what we had anticipated year-to-date. Bottom line: \$796,000 of revenue.
  - iii. Cash Flow: Net income of \$1,380,000. Large increase of receivables. Capital expenditures were \$66,000. We really had one major purchase new desk chairs from Steelcase. Endowment: \$150,000 of gains. Ending cash balance of \$4.5 million.
  - iv. Balance Sheet: Cash balance of 4.5 mil. Revenue: \$4.4 million balance of receivables, which are primarily pledges. Our fund balance is \$27,167,000.
  - v. Beth Server motioned to approve the financials through November 30, 2021. Jennifer Brown seconded the motion. *The motion carried*.

#### b. Investment Analysis

i. Our investment balance as of December 31, 2021 is \$12,860,000. Our gain for the fiscal year is 4.68%.

#### c. Midyear Budget

- i. The Finance Committee approved this midyear budget last week.
- ii. Revenue:
  - 1. Government/Fed: \$26,000 increase: Housing Stability Counseling. New Program through Housing Action Illinois.
  - 2. Contracts: New grant through Shirley Ryan AbilityLab. \$77,000 for a new Arts & Culture program.
  - 3. Contributions: Adjusting that by \$670,000. Includes adjustments for a MacArthur Foundation grant (\$525,000 three-year grant). We also have 75,000 from CCT for vaccine distribution.
  - 4. Major Gifts: Increasing by \$500,000.

- 5. Legacy Campaign: Need to incorporate what has come in this year.
- 6. Total budgeted revenue: increase of \$1,564,000.

#### iii. Expenses

- 1. Salaries and fringe benefits cancel each other out.
- 2. Bonus: We are including \$150,000 for a year-end bonus. It is contingent on approval from the board in June 2022.
- 3. A lot of line items have been adjusted due to Covid.
- 4. Large increase to specific program expenses: \$70,000 for new Shirley Ryan AbilityLab grant.
  - a. Anthony: We might want to consider adding NFTS to the A&C program.
- 5. Total expense change: increase of \$85,000.
- iv. Revised budget: To get to a net-zero, we will need to utilize \$476,000 of MGC money.
- v. Chad Turner motioned to approve the FY22 midyear budget. Jennifer Brown seconded the motion. *The motion carried*.

- I. Call To Order
- II. Chair's Report (John Schmidt)
  - A. We will lose several Board members at the end of the year due to our term limits. I think we should reach out to various Chicago based disability groups for leads, focusing ideally on the Latinx community.
  - B. Amber: The Legislative Accessibility Act passed out of the Illinois Senate today. Neil Hartigan recently participated in the hearing, despite technical difficulties of the state.
- III. President's Report (Karen Tamley)
  - A. Major Gifts Campaign Update
    - We are in the early stages of a multi-million dollar gifts campaign and working closely with our fundraising consultant Jim Feldstein and various committee chairs. John Schmidt is happy to be the co-chair of the campaign.
    - 2. Our in-person gala is on June 22nd and we are looking to tie the two together. You will be hearing more updates in the coming weeks.
  - B. High Level Advocacy
    - 1. I will be speaking at the Disability Philanthropy Forum on February 7th about the future of the workplace in a post-pandemic world through a disability lens. We are already in talks with various potential funders who we met through this forum.
    - 2. I was also invited to do a high-level blog on technology, digital accessibility, and how that impacts nonprofits and philanthropy. Bridget will be helping.
    - 3. I am a taskforce member on Mayor Lightfoot's cash assistance pilot program to deliver extremely low income Chicago residents.
    - 4. Cook County Forest Preserves is making headway on providing accessibility such as trails and campgrounds. They would like Access Living to help spread information about the tax levy on the November ballot which would result in a dramatic increase in accessibility.
    - 5. Access Living has been working with Steelcase to re-imagine what furniture and workspaces could look like in the new hybrid plan.
    - 6. I was on the Chicago Community Trust's podcast recently as a community leader to discuss COVID response.
  - C. Hybrid Plan

- 1. We are currently reopening our building on March 21st, including vaccine and booster mandate. Staff will come in two days per week minimum, and we are currently upgrading the building with hybrid-centered technology.
- We hope to have a hybrid board meeting in April and keep our committee meetings virtual, at the discretion and communication of the committee chair.

#### IV. Program Committee (Amber Smock)

- A. Spring Legislative Advocacy Update
  - The future of digital accessibility legislation is essential, but we need to ensure we are not harming current people with disabilities by doing so. Senator Duckworth's office has been working with us.
    - a) John: How do we relate to national groups when it comes to the federal effort?
      - (1) There are a number of national groups that we work with, but right now there doesn't seem to be one group setting the national disability agenda. Sen. Bob Casey's staff have a good perspective, but a leadership gap still remains.
  - 2. Given the political dynamics at the federal level, it is unclear what can be passed in the current session.
  - 3. Karen and Amber both met with Secretary Grace Hou recently to discuss key priorities with DHS.
    - a) We spoke at length about CESSA implementation. The Division of Mental Health is moving forward with coordinating committees and planning implementation, but they have not reached out to Access Living directly.
    - b) We also discussed the use of funding from the American Rescue Plan.
  - 4. Denise Avant is leading the fight for electronic voting. While this is promising, we are simultaneously considering a rally next week to raise general awareness about the bill.
  - 5. The Legislative Accessibility Act passed out of the Senate today.
  - 6. We are asking for \$7.5m with other CILs to administer an improved home modifications program. Currently they are few in number, small in scope, and tend to focus on assisting landlords not tenants.
- B. Civil Rights Update (Ken Walden)
  - Charlie Petrof helped with a current case. We have a client who is a student with a disability. He had nursing care and CPS provided the nurse until a policy change. CPS claimed they did not have to secure, identify, or hire a nurse for the client. We filed a motion which led to settlement discussions. CPS has agreed to find a nurse, despite the nursing shortage.
- V. Finance & Human Resources Committee (Neil Anderson)
  - A. Wage and Salary Analysis

- Historically every few years Access Living revisits wage and salary analysis compared to similar companies in our market sector and other similarly sized Chicago nonprofits. We are currently early on this project. Kent has been very helpful in identifying resources.
- 2. Access Living wants to ensure the entire process is reviewed through a racial equity lens.
- Our plan is to utilize the data to adjust our salaries as necessary with increases going into effect as part of the FY23 budget to submit for approval in June.
- 4. Ben: When we do that benchmarking are we looking at other things besides salary? (i.e. retirement, benefits, total compensation structures, etc.)
  - a) The scope of this project does not include these additional benefits, but we have had internal conversations on how to address that in the future.
- VI. Resource Development & Communications Committee (Jennifer Brown)
  - A. Development Updates
    - 1. In the 2021 calendar year, we have raised \$205,250 in the Lead Onward campaign. We also did a year-end solicitation which resulted in \$87,631.06 which was very successful.
    - 2. In 2022 we have raised \$120,000 towards the gala and moving forward, we will report on 2022 updates.
    - 3. JP Morgan Chase will be the corporate chair of the gala this year.
    - 4. The honoree this year is potentially Chance The Rapper, which would be an exciting way to "restart" the gala.
  - B. Media Clips (Bridget Hayman)
    - Our book of business has been growing, thanks in part to Kevin Bradley.
       This growth has allowed us to expand our team. Beginning next week we will be searching for a new P.R. coordinator to help augment the new Disability Institute Training Coordinator role. One of the roles on the communications team will expand to focus on digital accessibility advising for our clients.
    - 2. Kevin: Are you going to be looking for an early-career or a more experienced candidate? Do we look at schools with good communication departments and disability programs?
      - a) At this moment for this role, we want to hire an early-career candidate and train them up. I will be sure to look for such schools. Due to the growth of Spanish speaking media in Chicago, an ideal candidate would be a Spanish speaker, as well as a person with a disability.











# Community Reintegration: Housing






# Community Reintegration: Stepping Stones






# Community Supports: Housing Counseling








# Number of Consumers who Receive Accessible Materials about Housing Information, as it Relates to Access Living Programs







#### Key Campaign Activities and Wins

Access Living secured a partnership commitment from the Illinois Architect of the Capitol to support the Legislative Accessibility Act, which then sped through spring session for full passage.

#### **Education Policy**

Access Living secured both House and Senate both House and Senate champions for HB5096, the Keeping Kids in School Act. This bill would require schools statewide to document informal suspensions or school removals. The bill advanced to the House Education Committee and we will work to pass it during veto session.

#### Health Access Policy

FAS secured a commitment from the City to work on a pilot program to ensure that when an ambulance picks up a disabled person, their wheelchair is also secured and brought to them at the hostpital where they are taken. Acess Living was also asked to advise on the start of major state and federal campaigns to expand HCBS over the next five to ten years.


#### **Transit Policy**

Access Living succesfully worked with Better Streets Chicago to raise the public profile of #PlowTheSidewalks, including through a video PSA, Access Living also successfully worked with the City to propose a pilot program to shovel sidewalks, which is currently under review by CDOT.

#### **Housing & Employment Policy**

Access Living led a successful push to pass a statewide ban on source of income discrimination. Access Living also began talks with the State on a joint jobs/economic justice agenda for people with disabilities.







More from The City of Chicago on their Snow Clearing Ordinance:

The City's snow clearing ordinance requires property owners to clear a path at least 5 feet wide on all sidewalks adjacent to their property, including any crosswalk ramps.

Snow should not be shoveled into the right-of-way, which includes: transit stops and bus pads, parking spaces, bike lanes, bike racks, Divvy stations and any other space where snow impedes traffic of any kind. Individuals found pushing snow into the public right of way may be subject to a citation.

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

# Access Living Legislative Roundup

April 13, 2022

Legislative Wins

HB 2775: Bill to end source of income discrimination statewide, strengthens certain areas of tenant rights. Access Living staff led this in partnership with allies.

HB 4437: Expanding Medicaid to undocumented folks 42 and up. Access Living supported this through the Healthy Illinois coalition.

HB 4595: Protects the 340B Prescription Program against harmful practices by pharmacy benefits managers. Access Living supported this through the Protect Our Care Illinois coalition.

HB 4920/SB3774: expand Earned Income Credit to childless workers ages 18-24 and over 65, and folks with ITINs. Access Living supported this with the Illinois Coalition on Immigrant and Refugee Rights (ICIRR).

SB 180: Legislative Accessibility Act. Access Living led on this bill, which is about improving coordination of accessibility with the Illinois legislature in their business with the public at the Capitol complex, including the Bilandic building in Chicago.

SB 829: Creating the beginnings of a certified remote accessible vote by mail system for the general election this fall and going forward.

Access Living supported advocates with National Federation of the Blind of Illinois and the Illinois Council of the Blind.

SB 1975: Automates renewal of disability homeowner homestead exemption for qualified people with disabilities. Access Living worked closely with the leadership of the Cook County Tax Assessor, Fritz Kaegi, on this bill.

SB 3132: Expands the Illinois DHS-DRS
Home Services Program by allowing spouses
to qualify as Individual Providers.

Budget items: Centers for Independent Living (CILs) saw a 3.9% increase in state funding, and the State committed an additional \$96.4 million for the DHS-DRS Home Services Program.

## **Additional Important Wins**

Although Access Living was not a key player in the following efforts, they are important to our disability community as a whole.

The budget includes \$170 million in new Medicaid reimbursement funds for mental health and substance abuse.

A major nursing home reform consensus bill was passed, for the first time tying staffing levels to state funding for greater accountability.

SB 1633 was passed, improving nursing home resident rights and internal grievance procedures.

Developmental disabilities advocates won a \$1 per hour wage increase for direct service providers, but there is more work to be done.

## What We Will Keep Working On

We also continued to see progress on other fronts and expect to keep up our advocacy on the following, post-session.

HB 1587: \$7.5 million for a statewide home modification program run by CILs. The bill passed the House but needs to make it through the Senate, so we will focus on that as the next step.

HB 5096: The Keeping Kids in School Act calls for improved documentation of school removals, also known as informal suspensions. We made good progress in the House, but will keep working on it over the summer.

Although we applaud the increase of funds towards the wages of developmental disabilities workers, we know this is not enough and we support the They Deserve More coalition in calling on our state to fully fund the recommendations of the Guidehouse Rate Study.

We also will continue to press to include home and community based services as part of Medicaid to undocumented people in our state.

## City of Chicago (Affordable Rental Housing Program) – Federal Court Case

This case alleges the City of Chicago's Affordable Rental Housing Program, over three decades, failed to comply with federal civil rights laws that require the program to be accessible to people with disabilities, and that this failure has contributed to the dearth of affordable and accessible housing opportunities throughout the city.

As reported previously, the parties have moved into the discovery phase of litigation, which involves the sharing of information with each side via formal written requests for information, and interviews with potential witnesses.

District Court Judge Dow referred the parties to Magistrate Judge Cole to manage the discovery process. We regularly appear before Judge Cole.

Discovery continues. We have been conducting site inspections of City-supported/City-funding affordable rental housing throughout Chicago, to assess compliance with federal accessibility requirements. We retained two architect experts to conduct these inspections. We anticipate they will assess over 90 properties, a sufficient sample size from which to draw conclusions about the City's compliance with accessibility requirements.

#### We are also conducting depositions of city officials.

#### City of Chicago (Housing Shelters) – Federal Court Case

This case alleges the City of Chicago's Emergency Shelter Care System is not accessible to people with mobility disabilities, in violation of Title II of the ADA. The City filed a Motion to Dismiss our complaint.

District Court Judge Valderrama ruled on the Motion to Dismiss. He held our client has standing

to sue for injunctive relief, which is a big victory that enables the matter to move forward toward the goal of remedying the systemic access problem within the shelter system. However, he also decided our client did not have standing to sue for individual damages. This was a disappointment, but fortunately our client does not have a large claim for individual damages.

On April 8, 2021, Access Living's group DRACH (Disability Rights Action Coalition for Housing) filed a Motion to join the litigation. DRACH alleges standing, both on behalf of its homeless members, and in its own right, for frustration of its mission to advance the cause of affordable and accessible housing. The court granted our Motion to add DRACH as a plaintiff.

Both sides have initiated discovery. Since the last update, we have answered all discovery requested of Ms. Carter and DRACH. The City has produced some documents in response to Plaintiffs' requests, but has dragged its feet on a full response. The City has still not responded to our November 2021 letter that detailed its discovery shortcomings, although the City suggests its attorneys have finally gathered a significant number of documents that might be responsive. Due to the City's delay, the Judge extended the fact discovery period to September 9, 2022.

The City has also hired the firm of Jackson Lewis to assist it in defending this case.

#### Haymarket Treatment Facility in Itasca – Federal Court Case

We represent Haymarket in its application to operate a treatment facility in Itasca for individuals with substance abuse disorder and related mental health disabilities. The Haymarket effort has faced stiff and vocal opposition from members of the Itasca community. Note that those in recovery are considered people with disabilities under the federal Fair Housing Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

With our law firm partners, Daspin & Aument (attorney Bridget O'Keefe), and Bond, Dickson & Conway (attorney Mary Dickson), we aimed to get approval for the facility from the Village of Itasca, through a series of zoning hearings conducted before the Itasca Plan Commission. However, we expected the Village to deny Haymarket's application, which it did. First, the Plan Commission voted to recommend that the Village Board deny Haymarket's application. Then, on November 2, 2021, the Board voted to deny the application.

On Tuesday, January 11, 2022, due to the rejection of Haymarket's proposal, we filed a complaint in federal court. **Our co-counsel on the case are Jennifer Soule of Soule Bradtke & Lambert, Ms. O'Keefe, and Ms. Dickson.** The principal goal of the lawsuit is to force Itasca to reverse its decision, which is rooted in discrimination against people with disabilities. We also seek damages and attorneys' fees. On the morning of the filing, we conducted a media event in

front of the Access Living building. That event, in combination with other public relations work by Access Living's Communications Team and Haymarket's public relations team, generated a great deal of local and national media coverage. For example, every local news station, and every major paper in the area, covered the filing, and the story was picked up by the AP wire, which led to pieces in the Washington Post, Newsweek, and U.S. News and World Report, among many other newspapers.

Each defendant was served with the Complaint. The Village of Itasca, the Plan Commission, and Itasca's Mayor filed an Answer. The Fire District filed a Motion to Dismiss. The School District and its Superintendent also filed a Motion to Dismiss. We will file briefs (arguments) to oppose the Motions to Dismiss. They are due April 29. In the meantime, while the motions are pending before the court, discovery will occur.

## CPS (Nursing in Therapeutic Day Schools) – Federal Court Case

We represent a CPS student with multiple disabilities. For years, through the IEP process, CPS provided a full-time nurse to administer seizure medication to the student. CPS provided the nurse even though our client was placed in charter and therapeutic day schools for most of the time he received nursing services. At the start of this year, coinciding with a return to in-person learning and a national nurse shortage, CPS suddenly announced our client's therapeutic day school was responsible for finding the nurse to satisfy the requirements of the IEP.

CPS has so many administrative requirements related to nursing services for its students that it is practically impossible for any therapeutic day school to hire a nurse on its own. The new policy amounted to a de facto denial of nursing services. The client, up to this point, had been working with the Loyola Civitas ChildLaw Clinic. With this new nursing policy, Loyola asked us to cocounsel with them to file a challenge to the policy under the ADA.

On September 10, 2021, we filed a Complaint against CPS. It argued the change in administrative methods is prohibited because it discriminates against children whose disabilities require nursing services. On September 17, 2021, having been unable to resolve the matter through negotiation, we filed a Motion for a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) to stop CPS from changing its method of administering nursing services. The Court asked for full briefing on our motion.

We appeared in court three times on our motion. After briefing, CPS changed its behavior and began to search for a nurse to fill the terms of our client's IEP, which resulted in the judge holding off on making a ruling on the motion. Unfortunately, the effort by CPS to secure a nurse proved to be a challenge due to the national nursing shortage, and the fact that CPS pays nurses at a rate below the market rate.

On November 3, 2021, the judge denied our request to issue the TRO, which was a disappointment.

Even though the judge denied our request for a TRO, we negotiated a settlement with CPS. We worked out a higher payment standard and reimbursement terms to allow the therapeutic day school to hire a nurse. If a nurse were not identified in a timely manner, we would meet with CPS to look at other potential placements. We dismissed the litigation in compliance with the terms of the settlement, and the search for a nurse continued.

The search for a nurse finally bore fruit. With significant assistance from our cocounsel at the Loyola Childlaw Clinic, our client's therapeutic day school hired a full-time nurse, and CPS is reimbursing the school for that nurse at a rate above the contract rate for CPS nurses. Our client achieved all the goals he sought to achieve when he retained us. We have completed work on this litigation.
